Background

The mission of Muskoka Community Foundation (MCF) is to champion the power of giving and its enduring impact, and to connect philanthropy to community needs.

The Muskoka Community Foundation works to foster community vitality and resilience by:

- Connecting donors with causes they care about and ensuring their contributions continue to grow;
- Granting the investment income from endowment funds to a wide range of Muskoka charities; and
- ✓ Building capacity and celebrating community through special events, workshops and symposiums.

In 2012, the Right Honourable David Johnston, Governor General of Canada issued a challenge to community foundations to come together and build a smarter, more caring nation that holds promise for all. Muskoka Community Foundation joined community foundations across Canada in responding to this challenge by creating the Smart & Caring Muskoka Fund. This is a pooled community fund which ensures that there are dedicated resources to respond to the future needs and priorities of Muskoka.

Muskoka Community Foundation received an invitation in 2014 that offered a wonderful opportunity to expand its initial response to the Governor General's challenge. The Foundation was invited by the Breuninger Foundation to host a symposium at Wasan Island on Lake Rosseau to initiate a conversation about philanthropy in Muskoka.

Wasan Island is the site of the Breuninger Foundation's international retreat. The Breuninger Foundation is a private foundation based in Germany that was established in 1968 by Heinz Breuninger and his daughter Dr. Helga Breuninger. This foundation welcomes people from around the world and offers leaders in civil society, politics, culture and business the opportunity to gather, consider important questions and to enhance their potential. The island is a beautiful and natural setting that captures its Muskoka heritage and is a wonderful place to reflect and have important discussions.

On June 1, 2016, Muskoka Community Foundation convened a second symposium on Wasan Island with the support and participation of Breuninger Foundation about building a smart and caring Muskoka for our young people. There were thirty-two participants that included representatives of Muskoka Community Foundation, donors, charities, not-for-profit organizations, government and business. In the morning there were plenary sessions that were held in a circle format to discuss the issues facing young people in Muskoka and in the afternoon there were four small group sessions to design future action. The results of this symposium are summarized in this document and are intended to provide a reference for participants in pursuing deeper action. The summary will also assist Muskoka Community Foundation in guiding donors, undertaking its own granting, and building community vitality.

Purpose of the Building a Smart & Caring Muskoka for Children and Youth Symposium

The purpose of the Building a Smart & Caring Muskoka for Children and Youth Symposium was to consider how to improve the well-being of Muskoka's children and youth by:

- 1. Understanding the issues and challenges that young people in Muskoka face.
- 2. Identifying the priority issues and challenges that require action.
- 3. Considering how we can work together to address the issues that face our young people.
- 4. Designing action to make a difference.

Young Muskokans – Why Should We Care?

Symposium participants identified the contribution of young people to Muskoka communities and why they should be a priority.

Challenges – What Issues Face Young People in Muskoka Today?

The participants at the Smart & Caring Muskoka Symposium identified the challenges and issues that currently face young people in Muskoka. These challenges generally fell within six categories including:

- 1. Systemic evaluation and improvement
- 2. Transportation
- 3. Opportunities for youth
- 4. Access to supports
- 5. Family of origin
- 6. Geographic scope & connection

The first four categories were selected as priorities for more in depth-discussion and the action recommended is explained in the following sections of this summary report. The final 2 categories were not discussed in detail, and could be a topic of future discussion. The issues identified for these two categories included:

Family of Origin

- Poverty and the generational cycle of poverty
- Homelessness and lack of affordable housing
- Family connection and dysfunction
- Sexual violence
- Youth justice
- Youth sexuality and access to porn
- Addiction
- School
- LGBTQ
- Ability
- Socio-economic divide in Muskoka and lack of year round employment
- Socio economic status and access to recreation
- Sense of belonging
- Mental health and well-being

Geographic Scope & Connection

- Muskoka is a large rural area with 7 municipalities and 2 First Nations
- Barriers to unity and relationship connections
- Barriers to communication and collaboration
- Inclusiveness
- Relationship with First Nation communities and lack of services for First Nation youth

Designing Action Building a Smart & Caring Muskoka for Our Young People

Four small groups discussed the priority areas of concern for young people in Muskoka and recommended potential action to address the issues. The following includes a summary of each group discussion.

1. Systemic Evaluation and Improvement

The Issue

There is no collaborative mechanism for planning for young people in Muskoka. There is a need for data collection, gap analysis and the initiation of a planning table for children and youth in Muskoka.

The Desired Outcome and the Common Agenda

A Muskoka-based planning body is created to provide more co-ordinated and effective results for children and youth in Muskoka.

The Beneficiaries

- Children and youth ages: 0 to 24 in Muskoka
- Muskoka and its communities
- · Organizations that serve children and youth in Muskoka



Action

- A meeting of all youth-serving organizations in the region should be called by the anchor groups which would include: Simcoe Muskoka Family Connexions, YWCA of Muskoka, Muskoka Parry Sound Sexual Assault Services and the District of Muskoka, to explore the potential to create a regional planning body for children and youth.
- Funding and resources should be sought to complete a feasibility study for the creation of a planning body for children and youth and to undertake an evaluation of the current system and identify improvements. The Trillium Foundation may be a source of funding.
- Request that the Muskoka Community Foundation send a letter to the anchor groups, sharing the symposium report and supporting the action recommended.
- A terms of reference for inclusive collaboration about the issues facing young people in should be developed by the anchor groups with the participation of the organizations that serve children and youth in Muskoka.

Timeframe

- A meeting to discuss the development of a planning body should be held within 6 weeks (Mid July).
- A quick win would be to organize and hold a meeting of child and youth-serving groups.

Lead and Participants

- Leadership should be shared by the anchor groups.
- Wide participation of groups that serve children and youth in Muskoka should be sought.

Resources

- Initial resources will be needed help the anchor groups organize and administer meetings and to explore funding options for the feasibility study.
- Consider the option of having one of the Anchor groups assign some staff time to accomplish these tasks.

• Additional funding will be necessary to determine the potential for a planning table and to undertake an evaluation of the system.

Other Considerations

• There were about 10 individuals from various child and youth-servicing organizations across Muskoka who participated in this discussion. All participants felt that there was real merit to pursuing these recommendations.

2. Transportation

The Issue

Due to Muskoka's population and its distribution, an economy of scale necessary to make traditional public transit feasible does not exist. Taxi services in Muskoka are very expensive, especially to travel any distance and vehicle ownership and operation is cost prohibitive for many individuals. Many youth seeking to obtain a licence are unable to fund the cost for driver's education.

Transportation for those without personal vehicles is very difficult and complicated in Muskoka (and much of rural Ontario) and it negatively impacts:

 Children and youth trying to access programs and activities



- Access to social services and programs
- Youth and other individuals seeking work or who need to travel to a job
- Employers.

Each of these areas of transportation need may require different approaches and solutions. Safety and security would need attention especially for small children. The mode of transport may also vary so that a car may be adequate in some cases while in other situations a bus may be necessary.

The Common Agenda and Desired Outcomes

Creation of transportation solutions that are designed to address the specific issues faced in Muskoka - "Made in Muskoka solutions". The approaches may vary depending on the transportation needed and should build on existing approaches or adapt approaches to create new models.

The Beneficiaries

- Families without personal vehicles
- Children and youth (access to activities and programs)
- Employees and employers
- Seniors
- Events and social activities
- Climate (lower carbon foot print)

Action

- Undertake a review of existing and adaptable transportation models that would work in the Muskoka context. Inventory previous studies and the existing programs (e.g. the Early Years program or the District rural busing program) and identify any beneficial connections or approaches.
- Consult with those who need transportation to determine need and ensure any solution is suitable. Consider focus groups by sector.

- > Consider and investigate new approaches such as:
- > A car share program in a social housing complex.
 - Solving the problem one person at a time. Provide a used vehicle for an individual who needs one and can pay it off over time. The funds would then go back into a fund to purchase another vehicle.
 - An electronic ride share board for car pooling similar to that used at universities.
 - Providing other options such as used bikes for seasonal workers.
 - Establishing hubs for service provision where appointments are coordinated (perhaps on one day) and provide a transportation service within a catchment area that would make a transportation service feasible. Build on existing hubs or networks such as the health centres in Port Carling and Dorset.
 - Government subsidies for individuals who have a car, but may need intermittent assistance for insurance or repairs to keep the vehicle in service.
- Design pilot projects.
- > Identify potential funding options that match solutions to needs including:
 - Engaging upper levels of government to encourage public investment in rural transportation.
 - Looking at new funding models (P3 approaches- public, private partnerships) that might see businesses with workers who are experiencing transportation issues working with government to implement a new approach.

Timeframe

• 90 days to undertake the scan and identify potential projects.

Lead and Participants

- A small and diverse working group should be convened. The initial group should include:
 - The Network (prepared to convene an initial group)
 - District of Muskoka
 - Local business

Resources

Meeting space and a convenor

3. Opportunities for Youth

The Issue

Young people in Muskoka require greater opportunity to learn, explore and experience in order to ensure their success. The areas of opportunity that should be enhanced include:

- Experiential learning for all young people beginning in elementary school in order to experience life beyond Muskoka.
- Programs and activities for youth in addition to those that are sports related.
- Places that offer freedom and are nonjudgemental for youth to gather and engage with each other.
- Funding for youth to use recreational facilities.
- Addressing the situation when youth are not attending school.



- Mentoring and funding assistance to ensure all youth have an opportunity to pursue post-secondary education including making entrance applications and attending programs.
- Coordination of youth employment and placement services.
- Initiatives to ensure mental well-being for children and youth.
- A youth lead perspective and youth participation in developing initiatives.

The Common Agenda and Desired Outcomes

• Opportunities are provided for young people that will enhance their experience and increase their confidence and resiliency.

The Beneficiaries

- Families
- Children and youth
- Organizations providing support

Action

- Hold a youth symposium similar to the Building a Smart & Caring Muskoka for Children and Youth that would build self-esteem and show them the possibilities for a positive future. Youth participants would include at risk youth with leadership potential (but not yet recognized leaders). The Board of Education and the Children's Foundation of Muskoka could assist in identify youth to attend the session and youth should be involved in designing the session.
- Investigate what programs are currently being implemented and link to, expand or adapt the successful initiatives. This might include the leadership program at Buckwallow or extending the YMCA model to other activities and learning experiences.
- Invite at risk youth, provide a space, present a project or challenge (something youth are passionate about) and let them move forward to design and take action. Promote youth lead programs. Market these as programs for success or opportunity rather than leadership.
- Extend the experiential programs that the District currently offers to children living in social housing further into the community to reach children with similar needs. Seek the support and participation of charities to design and implement such a program.
- Consider a pilot program to provide further space for youth to gather that uses the Youth at Heart program in Gravenhurst, The Network in Gravenhurst and the program at the Bracebridge Senior Citizen centre as examples.
- Ensure early identification of need around mental health or learning disabilities and enhanced provision of services that are accessible and immediate to promote well-being, confidence and resiliency.
- Inventory best practices and create a tool kit for organizations working with children and youth and test the current service directories to ensure that they are accurate and include all of the programs available.
- Encourage the school board and school representatives to join the discussion to provide their perspective and knowledge. Collaborate to provide mentoring and funding for making applications to post-secondary educational opportunities. Encourage community support for apprenticeship placements. Determine what action can be taken to support young people not currently in secondary school in pursuing learning and education.
- Promote more active collaboration and partnerships of charities and social service agencies to address the issues faced by young people in Muskoka.

Lead and Participants

- Establish a small working group of 4 to 6 individuals to pursue the idea of a youth symposium.
- YMCA and YWCA should be included since they have the experience and expertise with youth and safety issues.
- Youth (Grade 7 or 8 or an older group) that have unrealized leadership potential.

Resources

- A working group
- A venue, logistics and volunteers to hold a youth symposium or to offer a gathering place program.

4. Access to Support

The Issue

Access to programs and services intended to support children and youth in Muskoka is limited by the following barriers:

- Lack of knowledge about the services that do exist in Muskoka.
- Limited capacity (staff and volunteers or funding) which result in waiting lists or restrictive hours of operations for programs. For example, programs that run weekdays from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm and coincide with school hours.



- Children are dependent on their parents to access programs and it can be difficult to engage the parents or guardians regarding permission for their child to attend.
- Stigma or lack of confidentiality when meeting with counsellors.
- Lack of transportation to access a service or participate in a program.
- Lack of ongoing and consistent program delivery due to funding that typically lasts for two years and then may be directed to new initiatives by the funders.
- Expanding organizational regions results in catchment areas with a large geographic scope. This reduces provider knowledge of the area and responsiveness to need by increasing the time and ability to provide the service. It also affects the ability of the client to access the service.

The Common Agenda and Desired Outcomes

Collective action is taken by agencies and organizations to adapt delivery approaches and improve access to services for children, youth and families. Support is defined in terms of what benefits children and youth rather than by the needs of the organizations providing assistance.

The Beneficiaries

- Families
- Children and youth
- Organizations providing support

Action

- Design approaches that work with the whole family unit, not just the young people, and build relationships with parents and guardians.
- > Encourage mentorship (formal and informal) and broaden peer support initiatives.
- Seek youth input. Have youth committees inform programs and organizations and encourage them to feel empowered.
- Increase communications between agencies to better understand what services are available and how they can be coordinated. Build awareness of the social services and programs for youth and children in Muskoka.
- Create a service hub (physical and virtual) where service providers would share space and provide access to a variety of services. In order to address confidentiality and stigma, a wider range of services

than just social services should be included. (The delivery of some services such as those addressing violence against women may not be appropriate in this situation.)

- Agencies could collaborate so that appointments could be bundled for clients. For example, if a client is going to be at the District of Muskoka for an appointment, other agencies could work with the District to arrange the ability to deliver multiple appointments with a number of agencies in one location.
- Technology should be used where possible to deliver services and address issues of lack of transportation or stigma. Social media could be used to raise awareness, provide guidance and establish initial contact with clients.
- Develop a centralized voluntary driver program similar to the Cancer Society that could be accessed through an App. (Assistance could be sought for the App from The Network.)
- Community outreach workers could provide information for clients about the service options and assist them with access. They could also stay engaged with them for follow up, continuity and relationship strengthening.
- Expand capacity to reduce wait list times by developing a centralized volunteer bureau for Muskoka and by identifying professionals that will provide pro bono services.
- Encourage more consistent and ongoing government funding for successful programs and raise awareness with donors about the needs of children and youth in Muskoka.

Themes of the Symposium

- ✓ Young people enhance our communities and will define Muskoka's future.
- The issues facing our young people and their families are complex and difficult and many challenges are linked or overlap.
- Action and programs should focus on youth and children rather than on the organizations providing assistance and we should create a culture of supporting families.
- ✓ A youth lead perspective and participation in creating initiatives is needed.
- ✓ Muskoka based approaches and solutions should be pursued and expanded.
- Collective community planning, coordination and action can deepen our impact and improve the wellbeing of children and youth.

Moving Action Forward

The results of the Smart & Caring Muskoka for Children and Youth Symposium have been reflected in this summary report that will be provided to each of the participants and made available publicly on the Muskoka Community Foundation website. Muskoka Community Foundation will also share the contact information with those that attended the symposium so that the connections made at the session can be expanded and strengthened.

In the future:

- Muskoka Community Foundation will use the knowledge gained at the symposium to inform our donors and our granting.
- Several groups have agreed to initiate further discussions toward implementing action.
- Muskoka Community Foundation will consider the request made by the Systemic Evaluation and Improvement discussion group that the Foundation send a letter of support for the action they have recommended.
- Muskoka Community Foundation will contact the participants at the end of this year to identify what changes or action has been taken as a result of the Smart & Caring Muskoka for Children and Youth Symposium.
